"Finishing the Sermon"

There are rare occasions when I consider it important to finish a sermon. Usually I just disguise the conclusion of one as part of another, but with my final sermon that is not possible. So, I wish to add one further point on the significance of our warfare against the principalities and powers. In short, *the resistance of the Christian to the principalities and powers "unmasks" them as defeated by Christ and brings glory to Christ in the heavenly realms.* In my sermon, for example, I asked what kind of threat someone like Andrew Brunson poses to the Turkish government? Though he is charged with supporting a terrorist group, these trumped up charges hardly hide the fact that he is held for no other reason than he is the pastor of a small Christian congregation. From the standpoint of "flesh and blood," he and his little church pose no threat to the Turkish state. But the principalities and powers know that the Christian gospel is the power of God and that Andrew's faithful testimony exposes their defeat for all the host of heaven to see.

Which brings us to the distinction between spiritual warfare waged in the open in the case of phenomena like demon possession and the warfare waged with the unseen principalities and powers that hijack the structures that order and shape society. The first point to be noted is that a confrontation with demon possession rarely leads Christians to turn from the path of faithfulness. If anything, such encounters drive Christians closer to Christ. The matter is much different with the principalities and powers. Think only, for example, about the rise of Nazi Germany. How can one account for seemingly decent, ordinary Lutheran and Catholic Christians in Germany being caught up in National Socialism and its murderous anti-Semitism? Only through the recognition that evil powers can hijack culture and government and distort good things to the destruction of all that is good. In Germany, wounded national pride was twisted into an arrogant racism. A little farther down the path, the threat of loss of standing and freedom silenced opposition. These were just two tools of the principalities and powers to turn many Christians from obedience to Christ to participation or acquiescence in terrible evil. They abandoned gospel truth. They did not stand and fight in the evil day. They did not even recognize that the evil day had arrived until it was too late.

An Ethiopian friend once told me about his mother being set free from demon possession and coming to Christ. But then he added, "In the West, you don't 'believe in the devil' and so your whole society is at far greater risk. He is most dangerous when he works behind the scenes." That's why we need to "be strong" and "put our armor on."
