Stephen Ministry at FEPC

The Story of Stephen Ministry

The beginning of Stephen Ministry goes back to 1974 when, as a new pastor, Kenneth Haugk realized the needs for care far outweighed

what he alone could provide. Using his combined backgrounds in theology and psychology, Haugk recruited and trained nine lay people who had the gifts and heart to do caring ministry at his church in St. Louis. Within a short time, fewer people were slipping through the cracks; early care receivers included a widower, a blind person, a young woman with cancer, a truck driver forced to retire early, and an inactive member struggling with faith issues. We here at FEPC are among the beneficiaries of that small start, as one of the more than 10,000 congregations enrolled in the Stephen Series since then. The needs here may not match the list above, but there are hurting people everywhere, and we have Stephen Ministers waiting for a "caregiving match." The Stephen Ministry story will continue on as caring people refer their family or friends to the care of a Stephen Ministry. To get this started for someone you know or for more information about FEPC's Stephen Ministry, check the church website (under Ministries) or pick up a Stephen Ministry brochure around the church. Let the caring continue.

News from Judy Hill in Florida

As anticipated, I arrived in Florida November 30, along with my housemate Lois. The bright sunshine and warm temperatures here have been wonderful! A departure date for Michigan has not yet been set, but it will be the end of April or mid-May, depending on the scheduling of repair work.

REPAIRS TO THE HOUSE

Hurricane Irma hit Florida in early September 2017, but repairs to residences and businesses will probably take another year or even longer to complete. My mobile home had considerable wind damage: a totally missing garage roof, as well as a destroyed carport and walkway overhang in front of the home. It took me some weeks to find a company that would tackle the job in less than 9 months. The lack of certainty over the actual repair date (in early May?) has led to a question about when I will return to Michigan.

Once the garage gets a roof, I'll be able to proceed with the next step: having the electricity redone out there. The garage lights and circuits were destroyed in the hurricane. Using extension cords, I have been able to run the water heater, water softener, washer, and dryer; but there are no electric lights any longer. That is OK in the daytime, since we have the huge "skylight" of a missing roof. If, however, the laundry is still going after sunset, Lois has to take a flashlight out to the garage with her. The lawn sprinkler system also uses electricity coming from the garage and needs to be repaired. Happily, the summer months are rainy ones. I hope my lawn gets good and soaked!

As for the inside of my house, only one small area was damaged, with rain blowing in due to the damaged roof-carport-house interface. The stained ceiling will need to be painted. An unrelated (new) problem is water damage beneath the house, impacting at least some of the subflooring.

TRAINING MEN AND WOMEN AT THE SEMINARY

These months in Florida continue to be active ones in terms of ministry with the Bangui Evangelical School of Theology (BEST) in Central African Republic and Cameroon. Pascal, one of my doctoral students in Cameroon, expects to finalize his dissertation in March. Once that happens, the academic dean will schedule his dissertation defense, hopefully before the end of the school year.

All five of my New Testament doctoral students are teaching undergraduate courses at the two seminary campuses, reporting results to me at the end of each week. Daniel, a sixth former student, has also been added to this teaching corps.

Alphonse, who began his work on a New Testament Master's degree back in October of 2009, has finally completed writing his thesis and will defend it soon. Practical, non-academic help from many and the prayers of God's people enabled this student to finish his program. We are the thankful to the Lord for his faithfulness to Alphonse.

PRAYING TOGETHER

For 125 years now (1893-2018), SIM as a mission has lived by the motto of "By Prayer." God's grace in answering prayer has been a hallmark of my years with SIM, in active service and in my current retirement status. How marvelous and compassionate our Lord is!

An example of God's response to our needs in the realm of "Before they call I will answer" (Isa. 65.24) and "... immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine" (Eph. 3.20) came with a generous gift from a wonderfully loving church to help with hurricane repairs to my (inherited, uninsured) home. I had been praying about solutions but never considered this surprising (to me) way in which God provided, covering a major part of the contract for the garage and carport repairs. **PRAISE** our gracious God!

Keeping Up With the Latest News on Andrew Brunson's Case

Over the past few weeks there have been numerous, sometimes daily, reports found on the internet about Pastor Andrew Brunson. Depending on the source, you may have heard the "Turkish prosecutor is seeking up to 35 years in jail for the American pastor at the heart of a bitter diplomatic spat between Ankara and Washington." Or perhaps you heard this later report stating Pastor Brunson has now been charged with "leadership in a terrorist organization" and "prosecutors are seeking a possible life sentence". Another source tells us "The trial of imprisoned American pastor *Andrew Brunson* will begin in the Aegean province of İzmir on April 16." One article found stated that North Carolina Senator Thom Tillis visited Pastor Brunson this past week. He was quoted as saying, "Pastor Brunson is strengthened by his love for his family and his faith in God, but his health has deteriorated." Tillis also said, "He has lost 50 pounds and spends 24 hours a day in a cell with limited human contact. He is attempting to visit a doctor this week, which involves him being handcuffed and transported with several armed guards. He fears the possibility that the American government accepts the indictment and forgets about him, which we will not allow to happen." Another source reported that Pastor Brunson is only one among many pastors around the world being held in prison because of their faith. We hear more of Pastor Brunson because he is an American, but we should continue our prayers for all who are being persecuted for their faith in Jesus Christ.
