Timeline for Transition to Senior Pastor

For Pastor Kelly, becoming our Senior Pastor does not happen overnight. Some may wonder about the process and why it takes so long.

Once the Pastor Search Committee is formed, there are many tasks it must complete before making a recommendation to the congregation. On August 19 our Pastor Search Committee made the recommendation to call Pastor Brian Kelly Kurth to be our Senior Pastor, and the congregation voted to accept that recommendation. And in many of our minds, we may have thought that was the final step. But in the EPC denomination these are the first two steps in the process of moving Pastor Kelly to this role.

After our vote, Pastor Kelly met with the EPC Ministerial Committee on August 20 for a phone interview. The next step in the process will bring Kelly before the Presbytery for questioning at their meeting in Warsaw, IN on September 14-15. He does not know where his questioning will be placed on the docket. Once that hurdle is behind him, the final step will be the Installation Service at 3:00 p.m. on September 30. Once installed, Kelly will officially be our Senior Pastor.

We congratulate Kelly and his family as they remain with us, but step into a new role in ministry. Keep them in prayer as they move through the process and for Kelly as he prepares for his meeting with Presbytery.

Thank you to the Pastor Search Committee for their diligence and time in working through the process "decently and in order". Members of that committee included: Matt Beardsley, Debbie Bracken, Jenna Rockhold, Dick Sutton and Justin Trent.

Reflections on the 2018 General Assembly

The General Assembly is the yearly gathering of representatives from all of the churches in our denomination, The Evangelical Presbyterian Church. Many things were accomplished in Memphis, TN, as we gathered during a week in June. We experienced fellowship and worship as we reconnected and praised God with those we haven't seen in awhile; teaching and training as we heard from conference speakers who challenged us with anything from a focus on a biblical passage and what God might be saying through that to his people, to discussion on what it looks like to live out our faith in the public arena, such as a school teacher or a business person. And yes, the business of the Church was done as well.

We often hear from brothers and sisters around the world who are trying to live out faithfulness to Christ in settings quite different than our own. This year we heard from Immaculee Ilibagiza, a survivor of the 1994 Rawandan genocide. Immaculee was hidden in a bathroom for 91 days with seven other women as members of the majority ruling Hutu tribe slaughtered those of the Tutsi tribe. It is estimated that between 500,000 to 1,000,000 were killed in that 100 day period. Immaculee told her story of how she came to believe and trust in the God of the bible during her hiding and... how she even came to forgive. Her story of forgiveness (even of those she knew murdered her family) was so very powerful! She reminded us time and time again that this was only possible because Jesus forgave her...and us, who are guilty of cosmic treason against the One True God, and are now able (and dare I say, required?) to forgive others as well.

There is no lack of things to see, hear and do at the General Assembly. I've been impressed with the programing that they not only offer for the commissioners, but also the families. The kid programming included bible study and stories, worship, crafts, games and ventures into the city to explore the sites. The zoo, Civil Rights Museum, Sky Zone, and even a baseball game were included for those daring enough to sign up...and you can never underestimate the draw of the hotel pool. Our family certainly slept well at the end of the day.

I'll share one final highlight as I wrap up this entry. During one of the evenings, we had the opportunity to hear from Ligon Duncan, a well-known pastor and speaker. As he walked us through scripture, he reminded us that the very foundation of Christian Mission (local and global) was a promise. That 'mission' given (or commanded) to Abram... was itself a blessing. Obedience to the One True God would lead to the blessing of Abraham, and his family... but it would also lead to the well being of the world...that was God's promise.

That promise of God the Father to Abraham is ultimately fulfilled by the obedience of the Son, Jesus Christ, and applied through the ministry of the Spirit. What was that promise? Paul's letter to the church in Galatia says,

¹³Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us—for it is written, "Cursed is everyone who is hanged on a tree"— ¹⁴so that in Christ Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles, so that we might receive the promised Spirit through faith. (Gal 3:13-14)

Brothers and sisters, may these words remind us of the blessing and promise that we have in Christ, that those who were far away from God are brought near through Christ Jesus, and that we who are called by his name, are also called to be a blessing, like Abraham, to those around us, that they too might also come to know this redeemer and savior!

Update from Bob and Patty Meredith

August 5, 2018

The last five days - Patty has been VERY sluggish and hallucinating constantly - ALL DAY. Then, EXTREME movements in the evening and not sleeping until midnight or later. "Extreme movements" mean large STRAINING movements, grabbing, stretching, able to balance for hours while staring at the ceiling. (Amazing!). She actually works up a sweat during this time of movements!

Pray for wisdom for her neurologist that we will visit tomorrow - and pray she COOPERATES! At times she struggles to walk or eat. This is new. Pray he can answer my many questions.

This last week I interviewed reps from two different healthcare companies that can provide home health care for Patty. We have a great caregiver already but I need someone to fill in occasionally - or every night and weekends IF I go to Kenya and Zambia as planned at the end of September and part of October. I'm still leaning toward GOING - I need the break, and the visit with friends there and to attend the meetings with many Africa Nav leaders and a wedding!!

PRAY I find someone that really give me CONFIDENCE in them!

Whatever. THANKS for traveling with us as I try to work and serve the International Navs around the globe and my WIFE at the same time.

Jeremiah 33:3 - calling to God to show me great and mighty things that I do not know!! THANKFUL for His promises. Gratefully in Him, Bob

August 7, 2018

Brief summary of yesterday's doc visit: It was sad but encouraging to hear that he DOES know what he's doing and has seen this before. (Parkinson's psychosis - NOT the capgras. That's really rare.) He is HOPEFUL for Patty's "return" - but it will take time. He also ruled out why this is NOT any other "disease" we are dealing with. So, I'm even more confident we are "barking up the right tree".

Regarding my possible trip to Africa, it was painful - but important for me to hear him say:

- 1. do not count on Patty traveling at this time; it's too unpredictable
- 2. if I DO go, I would have to have someone here I had absolute 100% confidence in (I do in Cenida but she's only around during the week days) and
- 3. My input and observations every week are good for him. It's very important for him to continue to get my weekly "bobservations". SAD. but accurate, I guess.

So, I am rethinking even MY going to Kenya & Zambia.

Meanwhile, today Patty is having a pretty good (lucid) day!!! We've not seen this for about 2 weeks! Progress? Maybe. Or just a brief "visit" from Patty. Progress is NOT linear and therefore NOT predictable. Things can change by the time I get home. Or before.

Thanks for praying for me, us.
