Special Request from the FEPC Staff

FEPC Family,

In Psalm 27:1, David reminds us that the Lord is our light, our salvation, and the stronghold of our lives. He then goes on to ask the question, "Whom shall I fear?" The assumed response being, "No one," because these previous statements about the Lord are true. The prayer of the leadership here at FEPC is that you, like David, would find your strength, courage, patience, and hope in the One True God during this time (and always!).

We are in a unique situation never before experienced by any of our current generations. It is in the rarest of seasons where God desires to teach and grow us the most.

In the past, we have had a congregation-created Advent devotional...and we would like to try that again this year. This new devotional would be based on what God is teaching each of us during this time. Advent is a time of waiting. Of preparing. How much waiting and preparing have we been doing lately? Consider how long the Jews waited from the time of the prophets to the arrival of the Messiah.

This devotional would contain your individual thoughts and reflections in regard to what God has been teaching you during this time of waiting, how God has been calling you to grow in this unique season, or in what ways God has been nurturing a longing in you for His Church and Christ's return. Perhaps visit some of the prophetic Scriptures about the Messiah's coming or the passages leading up to Jesus' birth and consider what significance they have in our current circumstances.

To help shape these devotions, please utilize the following format:

- 1. A short passage of Scripture for us to read
- 2. Your thoughts/reflections based off of the passage and what God has been teaching you (during this time) about waiting/His character/our holiness/etc.
- 3. A short prayer to close

Each congregational devotional entry will be one day's reading during our 2020 Advent season. We would like to have all entries back in the office by the end of the month of May.

Even though we are "isolated" during this time, we are the Body of Christ. We believe as we share with each other in these short writings about our struggles and breakthroughs, our fears and our joys, in how God has revealed himself to us during this time, that we will be blessed.

Remember, God is our light and our salvation, and the stronghold of our lives.

Come, Lord Jesus.

Stephen Ministry Myth #3

Myth: Stephen Ministers are Spiritual Superheroes

This was not on the list of Stephen Ministry (SM) myths I planned to touch on this year, but it seems a good time for us all to be reminded that Stephen Ministers (and pastors...and other ministry leaders) are simply regular people who are ministering in a visible way the giftedness that God has provided. They have hopes and fears and family concerns, and...well, the same challenges you may be experiencing. They may have endured past crises, deep griefs, and various disappointments, and they have to examine and grow in their faith just as you do. Therefore they can be compassionate, caring listeners when you have a need, and right now it seems that circumstances are magnifying everyone's needs. Stephen Ministers' training has taught them how to be with hurting people and walk beside someone for as long as it takes to work through an issue or dilemma. The SMs are currently using Telecare visits with their Care Receivers and are finding it a useful way to listen and encourage others. And we have several SMs without Care Receivers just waiting to hear from someone like you. So please be in touch to request a referral to a Stephen Minister. 
CHURCH CONSTRUCTION





Reports are that all staff and children seem to be in decent health at this point and do not require hospitalization. The student residents are being restricted to the campus so the isolation of the virus is more easily maintained.

! Mountain Mission School is residence to nearly 200 children from ages 2 to 20 from throughout the United States and several foreign countries. The home provides housing, education, religious services, sports and college prep courses through private donors.

McClain Family Update — Highlights from their April Prayer Letter

Like all of you, we've been sheltering-at-home for some time now. Admittedly, this is an unusual time for everyone in the world. For our family, it has been the source of both joy and grief; peace and turmoil; understanding and also frustration.



"...and yet..."

These are the words of hope that we continue to cling to.

Covid-19 has forced the world to come to a screeching halt over the past few months. *And yet*, we hear of online church services reaching over one million people and thousands coming to Christ through those services.

Due to closed borders, restricted travel, and financial limitations we are in an indefinite waiting period. We do not have a foreseeable departure date, and are unable to plan for one until we see these things resume back to normal. *And yet,* we do still believe the Lord will make a way for us to serve Him in Ukraine. We believe in His perfect timing and we believe in His perfect plan, even when the circumstances and events that will bring about His plan might appear unconventional to us.

For our family, we have enjoyed learning new board games, watching old movies together, putting together puzzles, exercising together outside, taking walks, and have found a new hobby in fishing

This is a time of much uncertainty; and yet, surely the Lord's hand is still upon us. We all find ourselves in quarantine in our homes, isolated from our normal routine, and yet, surely the Lord will continue to meet to us. Due to this pandemic, our lives were abruptly changed, in ways beyond our control, and we are unable to assess for sure when normal will return. And yet, surely the Lord our God, our RISEN KING, will continue to speak with us.

April News From Judy Hill ...

The Past

From the time I went to Ethiopia in 1974 there were difficult times due to civil unrest and a lack of water where we all held on to a truth David had declared centuries earlier: "My times are in your hands" (Ps. 31.15). Later the military and civil disruptions in Bangui in the 1990s and the 2000s were most definitely marked by the comfort of another Psalm: "God is our refuge and strength, an ever present help in trouble.... Be still and know that I am God" (Ps. 46.1, 10).

Those verses and years of meditating on Scripture have inevitably led me to a conclusion that never ceases to fortify me: God is wise, mighty, and good. No matter the circumstances, he is still the sovereign Lord of the universe who will do what is right.

The Present

That truth is of course true for the present realities, with Covid-19 impacting the globe and our own daily lives. I thank the Lord for giving us his peace in uncertain times.

I returned to Michigan in mid-February, where I continue working with my students and colleagues at the seminary in French-speaking Africa. Both campuses (Yaoundé, Cameroon and Bangui, Central African Republic) have been closed for health reasons. Since putting courses online is not a viable option for them, it is unknown whether they will have the opportunity to complete the school year. As the coronavirus begins to make an impact on Africa, the implications are serious, given the fragile state of the national healthcare systems.

The Future

In that light, I have not been working on many plans for "down the road." I expect that the work I accomplish now, though, will lead to later goals, such as completed doctoral work for some of my students. I look forward also to the time when churches here will re-open, and we can fellowship together in person, hugs and all. One of my doctoral students is working on the letter of James in the New Testament. Reading the student's work has kept James 4.13-15 in my mind: "Now listen, you who say, 'Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city.' ... Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. ... Instead, you ought to say, 'If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that.'" Trusting God is a daily commitment, recognizing that he is sovereign and wants to lead us step-by-step.

Praying Together

Praying together is something that can be done at a great distance here below, since we all meet together at God's throne of grace. Please feel free to share any prayer requests you may have. Here are some current concerns that I would like you to pray about.

- 1. PRAISE the Lord: Dr. William reports that his health situation has improved, and he was able to return to teaching before the campus in Yaoundé, Cameroon, was closed.
- 2. PRAY for God's mercy on Africa as it confronts the coronavirus. Its healthcare possibilities are generally severely limited.
- 3. My doctoral student Kuzundelu was to have had his dissertation defense (on the book of Hebrews) in March. With poor internet connections, a video conference for that purpose is not a possibility, and the jury members are widely scattered. PRAY for wisdom and patience as a solution is sought.

May your own experience of staying at home because of the coronavirus threat not frustrate you but instead provide you with opportunities you may not often have had in busier days. The Lord is in control—a truth that should encourage us all!
