Stephen Ministry at FEPC

Stephen Ministry Myth #5: If a person says "no" when offered a Stephen Minister, we should simply accept that and not ask again.

Reality: If a person says no, I try to listen and respond to his or her concerns, and I recommend this approach to you, too. If they still decline, let it go for now, but keep the door open. And try to check back with them occasionally- two or three or times in the weeks or months that follow, in a consistent and caring way, and continue to pray for them. Sometimes people will become more receptive to Stephen Ministry after they've had more time to consider it. Or their situation may change, and they'll feel a much greater need for Stephen Ministry. In fact, this has happened often with the Care Receivers we've served here at FEPC, and your "priming the pump" as their friend or concerned church leader often plays a part in their eventually saying "yes." I've had several folks tell me they're glad we persisted in offering a Stephen Minister, and what a joy it could be for you to play a part in that!

TECHNOLOGY GRANT — THIS IS EXCITING!!!

At the end of April Pastor Kelly notified the Technology Team of an opportunity to apply for a technology grant of \$5000 through the Center for Congregations in Indiana. These grants were being made available to churches in need of technology updates related to connecting to their membership during this time of reduced attendances at church.

Dan and Heidi Troyer accepted the challenge to review the requirements and options for FEPC to apply for one of these grants. Some stipulations were that the grant moneys could not be used for items already planned for in the current budget. A lot of effort went into the preparation of the grant application.

On June 5 news was received that our Connect Through Tech Grant Application was Approved!!! There are a few more steps to be completed before we start acquiring the items applied for, but this was great news!

Dan said, "As I was researching updates to our current technology, it hit me just how much we had already been doing with so little. Every device that we were using for live streaming has been donated or indefinitely loaned to the church for this this purpose. Entering into this "shutdown" due to COVID-19, we did not need to purchase a single item to make sure we could engage our church family. As that sunk in, I am thankful for what we have done to this point and look forward to being able to expand our scope of abilities, with Church owned equipment. There are still needs related to engaging our church body remotely, and we plan to use this added technology to enhance what we have already been doing for about two years now. The total amount approved in the grant is \$5344 with the church matching 10% of the funding, which means \$4,809 will be provided by the Grant."

Indeed, this is good news for FEPC and you will see smiling faces on our tech team in the months ahead. A huge **THANK YOU** to Dan for all his effort in researching what we need moving forward, for detailing it all in a successful grant proposal, and now in following through with the implementation.

His Eyes Honduras

Felipe and Valerie Colby, missionaries our church supports in Honduras, are helping those around them during a rigid lockdown due to Covid-19. In addition to continuing to offer health, vision and dental services at the His Eyes clinic, they are buying and delivering food to families and children they normally serve in The Milk Project. Felipe advises that for \$10 they are able to purchase about 17 pounds of food for families.

Felipe Colby has written the following to FEPC:

Due to our ongoing worsening situation with COVID in Honduras, and the needs/burdens that is putting on us to continue operating the clinic, FAME (<u>www.fameworld.org</u>) on the SE side of Indy has agreed to help us by sending a container of medical supplies, hopefully it would ship in the next month . They are going to give us everything they can, but there will be extra room for us to try to get more supplies together.

If you would like to contribute items from the list below, containers will be available at the back of the Sanctuary and in Fellowship Hall on Sunday, July 5, 12 and 19. We would like to collect medical supplies and over the counter medicines like the following:

- Pain relievers (acetaminophen, ibuprofen, naproxen, aspirin)
- Creams (anit-itch, antibiotic, anti-fungal)
- Vitamins (non-gummy ... they melt)
- Soaps, lotions, hand sanitizer
- Bandaids, boxes of bandages, gauze, medical tape

Felipe also asks for our prayers ...not only due to the health crisis here that is worsening, but also for our staff who are working through this daily to help an increasing number of people that need help coming through the gate every day, for health, endurance, and the testimony to shine through them that what we are doing is from God specifically, and especially in times like these!



McClain Family Update

Greetings from Upstate New York!! We are grateful to have been able to connect with several of you these last couple of weeks. We'd like to thank all of you who have reached out, called, texted, or emailed. We have been here three weeks now! The weeks have been full, and have passed quickly, and yet, we have taken time to be still and and to dwell in the land the Lord has brought us too.

The other day, I recalled an exercise that we did in our ABIDE debrief training back in February. We were given several images to study and we were to choose which one best described our 'state' at that moment. They were each a picture of some sort of cross roads and they were all different from each other. I reflected back on how I felt when I looked at those pictures and when I looked at the one that described my emotional and physical state at that time. I have looked at that image many times over the past four months. My perspective of the image has changed as time has passed. I actually see it very differently now than I did then. It is much clearer and even more defined and the fear that was attached to it then has faded in the dusty desert sand.

I was scrolling through images on my phone and found the four included here. It is interesting to me as I study them how what comes to my mind differs from image to image. In the first, I focus on the the ominous clouds and rough water.

The second image to the right shows the lighthouse off in the distance, but because the photo was taken from the shore, the light house seems so far away.

The third picture is particularly special to me because the memory of this view is such a treasure. It was taken maybe a quarter of a mile from the first two, but the difference in perspective is striking. The clouds no longer look as ominous, nor the water as tumultuous. Somehow even the distance that separates the shore from the lighthouse seems less daunting, standing upon greener ground. You can almost hear the birds chirping if you concentrate a little bit...

Isn't this how we see life sometimes? I know it is for me. Over the past months, we have felt the pounding waves crash against us, seen the 'light' ahead in the distance, only to have the storm delay our arrival. And yet, we have also had many moments where even a slight change in perspective has altered our attitude and brightened our day, encouraging us to continue on.

This fourth picture shows two geese on a mound with the duck floating beside. Sometimes it just seems like you are a sitting duck, with nowhere to go. Often, we feel all alone on the journey.

We've felt this, too. And yet, even in those moments, God is faithful to reveal hidden resources all around us, possibly just below the water's surface, waiting to be taken possession of. We see this new land as a combination of all of these pictures - a new journey with the 'goal' in the far-off distance; challenging and exhila-



rating to navigate ('Isn't this exciting?') and one filled with much needed 'new perspective' moments; and though the enemy would have us feel alone and like we are 'sitting ducks' we believe in faith that God has given us this very land to dwell in, to fully posses, and to discover all the hidden blessings He has provided for such a time as this!

No matter what we face in front of us, when we look up, we look towards the One who holds it all in the palm of His hands. "Looking unto Jesus" is the theme verse for CC Zaporophye. We have included it in every update since we began the faith journey towards Ukraine and serving with CC Zap. As I ponder the picture above, I am reminded of the phrase 'beauty of holiness' that is found in 2 Chronicles 20:21. This verse speaks of the appointing of those who will 'sing to the Lord' and those who will 'praise the beauty of holiness.' As these saints went out



for battle, they were singing and praising their Lord, believing in His enduing mercy and in their certain victory in Him. I've been pondering this passage for several days. There is a popular worship song that has a line it that goes, 'Your righteousness in me is holiness.' As we were driving yesterday, I noticed that the sky had opened up into this beautiful, bright guiding light and the phrase 'beauty of holiness' and the lyrics of that song came to my mind. In that moment it all began to connect for me. As I face difficulty, challenges, and really, all things in life, looking unto Jesus, I will see His guiding light, leading the way. As I look unto Him, with thoughts of eternity, I will see the beauty of His holiness, of His sovereignty, and of His care and affection. It is His holiness that births in us a new song to sing, and praises burst forth, and His righteousness washes over us. Our perspective, our thoughts, our actions are aligned with His and we move forward, believing His mercy endures forever.

Dear Friends and Family,

I first found RUF the spring semester of my Freshman year at Purdue when a friend mentioned RUF to me and invited me to a large group.
