



Update from Felipe Colby and His Eyes

Well, well. We marched into February...and forgot to update you. And then in March... well, we marched right along and forgot again didn't we?

I had great potential themes for March... a tribute to John Phillip Sousa (words that contain star or stripe), anagrams of March, or...yeah, I didn't have very many ideas.

So... here are some bullet points and some prayers, and we'll try again in April, a month sure to be rife with great theme ideas that you just can't get enough of, right? Right?

- 1. We (Felipe, Valerie, and Soren) got back to Honduras in late January, right back to work. We are starting 2021 with big plans as a mission, and doing our part to help every-thing move forward.
- 2. Cecilia is doing well in the USA, working, schooling, and in general enjoying all things winter. Or at least most things winter. Soren is in his room 16 hours or more a day (sleep, online school, guitar playing, yelling while online gaming.)
- 3. COVID is still alive and well here, and while restrictions on movement have eased somewhat (still an overnight curfew), the hospitals are still overwhelmed.
- 4. We are looking at a bumper crop of coffee this year, but prices are very low on the open market. We will dry and store all of the coffee beans, while we look for more homes to enjoy drinking it in the USA (this will be a prayer item below for sure). The more coffee we can sell there, the more we can support the rural communities and churches in Honduras.
- 5. We will take a brief trip to the US mid-March...going to get more medicines and equipment for the clinic, do some necessary and some fun appointments, and visit some folks as well. JAX, Indy, and Fort Wayne...we are coming your way. Let us know if we could meet up with you!
- 6. The clinic hired a pediatrician in February which is a big help for sick kids. Now...what will be the next specialty that the clinic will add?

Prayer Requests:

- That God would open doors (literally!) to get more coffee into homes in the USA. Want some yourself? Know someone? Want to know more? Click <u>here</u>!
- 2. Safety for the staff from COVID. Pastor Manuel and his wife Leni recovered this month, praises!, but now one of the clinic staff has it and will be out for a couple weeks.
- 3. For the new pastor in Sampedrana, Juan, and his family to have a good transition, and God honoring ministry going forward!
- 4. For pastor Jonathan starting a new church in a new area (Guyavillas) and for God to show us the scope of mission involvement as the church progresses.
- 5. That God would provide more sponsors for the kids in the Milk Project. We are almost at 100 kids in the two branches (Teguc and Sampredrana) and when we reach 100, we want to open another Milk Project in another church! Want on board? \$38 per month to sponsor a child makes it happen. You can click <u>here</u>



Mission 672 - Report (February 2021) Departure: Norfolk, VA Arrival: New Orleans, LA

55 year old Thomas has been dealing with cardiac issues for sometime now. In 1999 he had bypass surgery and eventually had a pacemaker placed. Recently he went in for a lead replacement and ended up having his pacemaker replaced after some complications. This quickly went from an overnight procedure to quite an unexpected and unplanned hospital stay for him.

His family have been contemplating for some time now, what would be the best next step for him. They have decided to take him to New Orleans for hyperbaric treatment and then hopefully on to Baylor in Texas for extended rehab.

As I watch the crew walk out to board Nellie I am reminded of how blessed we are to have the very best volunteers anyone could ask for. So thankful. I am actually talking with Rossana (Thomas' wife) at the same time and assuring her they will be in extremely competent hands. The temperatures here in Indy this morning are still cold. The remnants of the recent 12 inch snowfall we were blessed with still linger in mounds made by the snowplows around the airport as a reminder of God's handiwork. The flight to Norfolk is filled with beautiful views of the sky and clouds. (I personally love flying over Naval Station Norfolk.)

The sun is shining when we land and we are greeted by the ambulance crew with both Thomas and Rossana inside. He has a full head of grey and white hair and a great smile. Rossana is tiny with long dark hair and she too has a wonderful smile. After a quick assessment we load them onto Nell and head to New Orleans.

We enjoy our conversation with the two of them. Thomas and Rossana met through their work as government contractors. She was actually training him. She was born in the Philippines and came to the United States because her mom was a diplomat. They have lived in Virginia where they raised their 4 children. Robert, who lives in Virginia Beach, Natalie, in DC, Rachel, in Arizona and Sarah living in Texas. They have also been blessed with 2 grandsons Jacob and Jackson. They have made it a priority to travel back to the Philippines every 2 years. They are now planning to sell their home and move permanently back to Rossana's home country.

They are renting a home in New Orleans for the next few months and transporting Thomas back and forth daily for his treatment. This seems like a huge task for such a small woman but through my many conversations with both Rossana and Rachel I can tell they are determined women and I have no doubt they will definitely accomplish what they have set out to do.
