# **Peru Mission Team Report**

Several fund raisers were held before the team left. Many of us may have thought those funds would be used for travel for the team, but they say the majority of those funds went to purchase supplies handed out to people in the communities visited. So, what did we help distribute to the people of Peru? Team members worked with members of the Moyobamba Presbyterian Church to fill large, colorful bags like the one in this picture. When filled, the bags weighed 30 lbs. each. Nearly 100 bags were distributed. Contents included: sugar, rice, oats, salt, cooking oil, beans, canned milk and laundry supplies.

Hey FEPC family! I wanted to share highlights with you from our 2022 mission trip to Peru.

The first highlight that I'll share is the opportunity itself to see and experience this South American country. Peru is a very beautiful and diverse place! We initially flew into the coastal and very cloudy city of Lima, which has an approximate population of just under 10 million people! We then flew to the hot and humid city of Terapota, a bit farther north, and considered a 'high jungle plateau'. From Terapota we travelled by bus through the mountains (and it was quite the harrowing ride...though it was on this leg of the journey that I experienced my first drink from a coconut!) to Moyobamba. It was here in Moyobamba that we spent the majority of our time.

The second highlight for me was the people. It was good reconnecting with several folks that I had been on trips with before. It was also enjoyable to make new connections with this particular group. There's nothing like travelling, sweating, and navigating through strange lands to bring a group together!

The third and final highlight that I'll share here is tied to the rationale for us going on the trip. Not only did we connect with local farmers to get a grasp on existing farming technique and to see how Hope in the Harvest might come alongside and be of some benefit (and it was quite an adventure getting to some of these farms... riding in the back of a pickup truck, crossing rivers, and wielding machetes!); but we also reconnected with the Moyobamba Presbyterian Church that we have significant history with. It was a blessing to worship together, work side by side putting together the food gift bags, and to then hand them out. Folks that received them were truly thankful! My prayer would be that we all would grow stronger in the Lord as we set our eyes on Him, walk faithfully in His ways, and truly live out being salt and light in our respective communities.

#### **Greetings from Tanzania**

Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

God is continuing to provide for the Kwetu Faraja family, and showing us His presence in the lives of our kids. Paul, Joseph, Elizabeth and myself just recently returned from a visit to Tanzania. It was such a joy to be together there as a family once again reunited with our Kwetu family. The kids bonded with their brothers and shared many wonderful experiences. Paul and I spent our time counseling with each of our boys and staff members, helping to advise about the direction of our ministry. We were most encouraged by seeing how our older boys have really stepped up in their roles as family leaders. They are taking the younger ones under their wings and mentoring them, caring for them, and showing them sacrificial love. The ministry of Kwetu was started in this way – older brothers caring for the young ones. We are thankful to see this legacy still in place. We continue to pray that the kids we raise will be the future leaders of the ministry.

There are also many difficulties being faced by Tanzanians at this time. Under the new President taxation has increased and inflation is making it extremely difficult for people to afford basic amenities. Soap, sugar, staple foods, and cooking oil have all more than doubled in price. Street vendors and small businesses have been chased out of the streets and many people are without a way to make a living wage. We are thankful that we are able to provide employment to so many people at Kwetu. Our staff members keep the basic operations moving forward on a daily basis.

In spite of challenges, we are thankful that our kids are growing in their knowledge of the Bible, their relationships with Christ, and in their formal educations. We have a large group of kids now preparing for advanced education. It is exciting to see them maturing and developing their gifts and calling. We wanted to share with you the financial needs of our current students and ask you to join with us in prayer that sponsors be found for each of them. The following are the annual educational costs for each of these students:

- 1 student completing his last year of Medical School \$3,000
- 1 University student starting his second year of studying Social Work \$1,000
- 1 student beginning Bible College \$230 (\$1,770 already raised)
- 1 college student studying business administration (\$1,000 already raised)
- 1 college student studying marine logistics \$1,000
- 4 boys attending Park Ranger/Wildlife Services training \$1,000 each (1 sponsored)
- **2 boys attending Junior college** \$700 each
- 11 boys in High School \$300 each
- **27 boys in Primary School** \$200 each

We thank you for how you have stood with us these many years, loving our Kwetu family, supporting our needs, and partnering with us in this valuable ministry. God has been so faithful to this work that He began. Please continue to pray that our campus be a light in the darkness, and a testimony to our village that they see the power of Christ at work through our boys and our staff members. Pray that our kids be encouraged in their daily walks, and that the Lord continue to develop roots in their lives as they foster a trusting relationship with Him.
