Stephen Ministry at FEPC

The After People

People sometimes ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are *The After People*. Stephen Ministers are there:

- ... after the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ... after the phone call you hoped you'd never get.
- ... after the last (or first) child is moved into the dorm, and the house seems suddenly empty.
- ... after the funeral, when everyone has left and all the feelings come crashing in on you.
- ... after you're called into the boss's office and you suddenly no longer have a job.
- ... after the baby arrives, demanding more than you ever dreamed possible.
- ... after the relationship falls apart, and the bottom falls out of your life.
- ... after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Recognize yourself or a friend in any of these scenarios? Stephen Ministers are *The After People*, ready to come alongside you—or your friend, neighbor, coworker, or relative—and provide comfort and support for as long **after** as needed. 



Stan & Faith in Japan

Dinner with friends

Dear Friends,

So much has happened in the last month! We flew to Japan on April 17 for an 11-day trip. We had mixed feelings as we departed the States, wondering if we should even be going after such a long time, yet looking forward to some of our arranged visits. Then, there was a question of how well we would do with the Japanese language since we aren't in a situation where we use it here in Charlotte. There were two parts to this trip:

Down Memory Lane



On Easter morning, we headed from our Airbnb to the church we planted 35 years ago. Walking from the train station, we were surprised to see that the department store nearby was now a massive hole in the ground! Other parts of the walk were familiar. We were warmly welcomed by church members and friends who live elsewhere but returned to see us. Stan gave the Easter message, and we enjoyed the covered-dish lunch. That afternoon, we visited a long-time member who is now in a senior care home.

Two days later, we took several trains to get to the church where Stan had lived for nine months when he first went to Japan as a short-term missionary in 1979. Pastor Kondo is now with Jesus, but his wife, two daughters, and a granddaughter were there. Zen Kondo is in her early 90s. Her ministry of prayer and caring for others was meaningful to Stan as a new missionary, and her family's commitment to Jesus is still a blessing to their community. We enjoyed lunch and conversation, and we were grateful for the two family members who spoke English well and could translate what we missed.

De La Cour Update — *continued*

Our first term in Japan ended with the premature birth at 27 weeks of gestation and the death of twin sons, just two weeks before we were to return to the US. Throughout this traumatic event, we experienced God's graciousness and the kindness of His people. Thirty-seven years ago, after a memorial service at the church we were attending, we went to a nearby park where we scattered their ashes. Now, back in Japan, the day after Easter, we went to the park to remember, reflect, and once again experience the comfort we receive from our hope in God and His promise of eternal life.

Connecting with our Mission Team

We headed to the A₃ Japan (formerly known as Asian Access) spring retreat. What surprised us both was how comfortable we felt with "our people" even after all these years. Here is an excellent summary of the retreat by A₃ president, Joe Handley.





I was particularly grateful for the continued focus the Japan field has on Member Care. Whereas I was the only person in this role for the mission when I left twelve years ago, they have a team of people equipped with a deep desire to encourage the members' well-being. This retreat was a handoff from one team of care facilitators to another, and I enjoyed talking with them and recommending current resources.



One day, a special guest came to the retreat. Ken Nishiono was the young man who came to Christ and was discipled through our international church ministry. If you've been a long-time prayer partner, that name may sound familiar. He became a pastor after serving in disaster relief following the 2011 "triple disaster." Ken is on a sabbatical and made an extra effort to see Stan.

Before we headed to Japan, we called this our "last trip," but we found ourselves saying "next time" as we left. And as for language, it was sometimes present and other times absent. One evening, we went out to a local mom-and-pop restaurant. Viewing us with caution at first, they lightened up when they discovered we could speak a little. So much so that the "mom" sat down next to me and talked through the whole meal. I kept up with the conversation for the most part. Stan came to my rescue when, toward the end of the meal, I couldn't remember the word for *Monday*!

Praise and thanks:

- Safety in travel, and generally good health
- Precious connection with friends
- A renewed connection with our missionary family

Pray:

- For a fresh season of growth in the ongoing ministry of our church in Japan
- God's grace to continue to be poured on Zen Kondo and her family
- Ken Nishiono's sabbatical time would bring refreshment and a new ministry focus
- Continued blessing and unity for the A₃ Japan missionaries as they are becoming increasingly multi-national.

One week after returning to the US, I was on my way to Colorado for MTI and the commissioning of their new president. We'll send a separate update with that and more good news!
